






Background on the Conference

- In November 2005, COY approved a recommendation to co-sponsor, with DMHMRSAS, a statewide conference to offer training on evidence-based practices for youth with mental health disorders.
- COY partnered with DMHMRSAS to combine efforts on their System of Care Training.
- CSA also partnered with DHMHRASAS and COY to provide financial and staff assistance for the Conference.

 - Held at the Hotel Roanoke & Conference Center



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Conference Themes

- Effective implementation of the System of Care philosophy
- Implementation of appropriate evidence-based practices within the community System of Care
- Strengthening the youth and family voice
- Maximizing resources to improve mental health outcomes for youth and families



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Key Partnerships Established

- Interagency planning contributed strongly to the broad appeal of the conference and to the wide spectrum of participants.
- The Planning Committee of 30 members divided into four working committees:
 - Agenda and speakers
 - Target audience and marketing
 - Family involvement
 - Exhibitor and vendor participation

- Approximately 550 participants attended
- Virtually all sectors involved in the children's behavioral health service system, including:

Accomplishments

- Obtaining nationally-recognized speakers
 - Experts in the field of children’s mental health, evidence-based practices, family involvement, and utilization of community-based resources.
 - Virginia experts, including COY members.
- Support from Private Sponsors
 - Private exhibitor/sponsors contributed \$40,750.
 - Additional donations of give-aways for attendees.



Accomplishments *(cont.)*

- First Lady's Family Scholarships
 - The Honorable Anne Holton, Virginia's First Lady, funded by the Puckett Institute to provide a limited number of family scholarships to attend the Conference.
 - 41 family members received scholarships so they could attend the Conference.
- Local Government Official Workshop
 - A special workshop enabled local government officials to come together to hear about the success in serving children in Hampton.
 - The theme – ***How to Effectively Serve Youth with Mental Health Disorders in Your Home Community.***
 - Representatives from 15 localities attended this session.



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Accomplishments (*cont.*)

■ Positive Evaluations

- Participants rated the Conference as extremely valuable and interesting.
- Attendees valued the participation of the legislative members and the First Lady.
- High ratings also for the participation of the youth and family members.
- Desire for even more information on “how to”, such as implementing evidence-based practices and systems of care.
- Desire to learn how more about: school services, permanency, transition services for 18-21 year olds, court services and the juvenile justice system, measuring outcomes, and creative funding and distinguishing types of funding.

- Optimism about future opportunities
 - Additional opportunities for new partnerships.
 - CSA to continue efforts with regional training focusing on specific needs of the regions.
